Minutes of 1916

Trista Watson, one of our veteran summer staffers, recently discovered a bound book of old Rhodes Grove minutes while cleaning out a supply closet. The book details the activities of the United Brethren as they met here on the grounds from 1898-1916. Of particular interest is the day they elected to look to the future by authorizing the purchase of the land we now occupy.

Minutes of 1916: "The United Brethren Campmeeting Association met in its regular annual session in the tabernacle at Rhodes Grove August 8, 1916 at 4 o'clock pm. Rev. D. A. Powell, president, called the meeting to order. The minutes of the previous year was read and approved. B.F. Blubaugh was elected secretary. The committee that was appointed to see Miss. Rhodes made there [sic] report, and it was approved. It was then suggested that we buy the Grove for \$4,000 and that this be divided up in \$26.00 shares and no one allowed to buy over ten shares. Passed. It was then moved and supported that the old committee be reelected. Rev. I. Lawrence Hoover was reelected treasurer. Adjournment. B.F. Blubaugh

We praise God for giving that group of leaders the wisdom, vision and courage to set in motion what we have today. May the Lord continue to grant us that same foundational spirit as we make plans for the future success and vitality of this mission.

In addition, as any summer camper can tell you, the rough concrete texture on the bottom of the pool will be replaced a smooth fiberglass finish that is sure to keep happy feet out of our nurse's office. Rhodes Grove is pleased to announce that our speaker for Campmeeting will be Dr. Kirby Keller. Kirby is a self-described "son of the King Street United Brethren Church" coming to know Christ there at a young age. As a native of Chambersburg, PA, Kirby enjoyed growing up on a farm where he developed a strong love for the

outdoors which continues to this day. Studying at Huntington College and Seminary in Huntington, Indiana, Dr. Keller earned graduate degrees at Princeton Theological Seminary and Fuller Theological Seminary. He has done additional graduate work in education at Lehigh University. He is an ordained Elder in the Evangelical Congregational Church and has served pastorates in Indiana and Pennsylvania prior to moving to Myerstown in 1976.

In 1987, Dr. Keller was appointed as Academic Dean of the Evangelical Theological Seminary where he served as the fourth president. He has also been the Dr. Clyde W. Meadows Professor of Christian ministry at the seminary since 1988. Kirby was originally ordained in the Church of the United Brethren in Christ denomination in the historic tabernacle at Rhodes Grove in 1968 where he also served as summer youth camp director. Over the years, he has become well known throughout central and eastern Pennsylvania as a preacher and teacher, speaking at conferences, seminars and campmeetings. On numerous occasions, he has served as a guest Chaplain of the Pennsylvania House of Representatives. He has been an active Rotarian for over twenty years. The Ecclesiastes Institute - Lancaster Bible College

Recognizing a need in our community, Rhodes Grove initiated The Ecclesiastes Institute at our facility at the beginning of this year to offer a variety of continuing education options for the purpose of Biblical enrichment, community outreach, and ministerial advancement. In partnership with Lancaster Bible College and Graduate School (LBC) our program uses CEU (continuing education unit) credits to measure academic progress. Typical classes are one-day events meeting at Rhodes Grove for 4-5 hours with a buffet style lunch included. Upon completion of coursework each participant receives CEU credit and a Certificate of Participation from LBC. Courses are open to anyone in the Cumberland Valley community interested in personal growth and leadership. Ministers and lay leaders alike are encouraged to attend. This year's classes included the topics: Christian counseling, managing conflict in ministry, a study of Psalms, family ministry and Christian leadership essentials. 
