A Super-Natural Summer Experience



Have you ever done anything that is so big that there is no way you could do it if it weren't for God? This



November 10, 2008 - Roadmap to Disciplemaking

Jesus said, "as you are going, make disciples" (Matthew 28:19). This introduction to what we know as the Great Commission, contains two important charges to us who are serving in His name. First is the issue of our lives as being on a journey. This entails both movement and progress. Second, is the charge to make disciples. This involves process and transformation. However, integrating this expectation of Jesus into our pastoral ministries is not an easy task. As you know, any journey can be beset by vehicle breakdowns, roadblocks, detours, and even getting stuck in the mud. Also, the transformation process entails change which has a built in resistance within the human spirit. In our time together we hope to enlighten the issue of the nature of our journey, what is our current location and condition, where exactly are we going, what is our roadmap, and how do we overcome some of the pitfalls that impede us from obtaining our destination? We also will be focusing on what kind of finished product we are seeking to develop in our roadmap to disciplemaking. What will be the form and function of our finished product? Did Jesus expect this task to be done by a limited number of professionals, or did he expect a reproducing disciple as the goal of the Great Commission We are blessed have the leadership of Bishop Ron Ramsey, Rev. Pat Jones, Director of Healthy Church Ministries, and the Rev. Jeff Bleijerveld, Director of Global Ministries. All three leaders serve the larger Church out of the headquarters of the Church of the United Brethren in Christ, USA.

Refurbishments

In an ongoing effort to offer clean and pleasing facilities and activities we have continued to refurbish and improve several areas of the facility.

Retreat Center – In addition to last year's upgrades, this year we have added air-conditioning, improved lighting, energy efficient doors and windows, improved solar light panels and a fresh coat of exterior paint. Lookin' Good! We will continue to make refurbishments to this key facility in the months to come.

Sound booth – We turned an unused coat closet in the Meadows Conference Room into a permanent location for our sound and video equipment. The bundle of cords and wires is now safely out

of the way of foot traffic. All materials used to frame up the booth were recycled from other projects and a brand new sound desk was donated by a neighbor/friend.

Zip Line – How about a 330 foot ride down our new zip line? Participants jump off a small platform 35 feet in the air (of course they are harnessed in!) and zip down the cable until a gravity induced stop brings their ride to an end. Now located near the waterslide this new activity was professionally installed by Griffin Adventures (Bill Weaver) and enjoyed all summer long.

Swimming Pool – As previously announced our pool had a major facelift this spring. The floor of the pool was resurfaced with a smooth

fiberglass finish, the leaks were repaired and we saved a bundle on chemicals and treatment this year as the operating system is now much more efficient. Thanks to everyone who donated funds to help make this happen!

Big Swing - Improved once again! Participants now go higher and faster as they are pulled up into the air by a group on the ground. Each rider chooses how high (s)he wants to go and self releases when ready. What a ride!

Shop Junk – Ok, we admit it....We camp people tend to be packrats when it comes to junk, thinking

that other people's cast offs may be of use to us in some way...at sometime. We are pleased to announce the kicking of this habit as evidenced by the visibly reduced amount of stuff hanging around the maintenance shop and horse barn. Over \$1000 was received as we recycled the "junk" metal at a local scrap yard.

Gaga Pit – This summer's campers went "GooGoo" over "Gaga". Gaga, from the Hebrew word meaning "touch" is a handball game played in an hexagon shaped, wooden-walled, pit. It combines skills similar to dodge ball, tennis and good ol' four-square. Played in a group setting but individually competitive, campers enjoy great exercise, the thrill of strategizing

Sewer Pumps - So, no one likes to talk about sewer and no one really appreciates the value of a sewer pump until it stops functioning like it should (Especially in the middle of the night on Christmas Day in the freezing cold). After a long winter of battling pump failures we had the problem fixed this spring. This, not-so-exciting project resulted in a pumping system that is of high quality, is highly efficient and gives us the heightened ability to continue to grow the number of people we serve. All that combined really is

exciting!

Horse Fence – At long last – A new fence around our arena! Some of you will remember that Mrs. Dice was the primary reason Rhodes Grove had a horse corral. She gave funds to purchase the supplies and even did much of the work involved in getting the original fence in the ground. This spring a group of volunteers, recruited primarily by the Frost/Conley families, came and installed the new posts and side rails. All of the materials were purchased with funds donated specifically for this purpose. The end product looks great. What are the most noteworthy changes that have taken place?

Grace: Moving from the old dining hall up to the new conference center.

Using the modern equipment makes it quicker - the way we serve now is better.

Loretta: We have more premade things now which is good. I remember having to cut up the raw meat like beef and chicken before we could start cooking. I like the new equipment but I still say you couldn't beat the old kitchen.

What is your favorite Rhodes Grove food/meal?

Grace: I like our Strawberry salads and Chicken BBQ - I like all our breakfast foods.

Loretta: I like whenever we have Turkey and filling. I love that meal - especially the mashed potatoes and gravy. I'm not much for spaghetti or ziti. I always look forward to the French Toast.

What most causes you to continue in work and ministry?

Grace: I like working with the people at Rhodes Grove and it is a pleasant place to work. I really like it. There is no tension and I love the kids.

Loretta: I like it – It's my type of work. I like my friends and the Christian people. I also know I'm liked and appreciated. Everyday you go in is a different day - not the same old humbug routine. Overall it has always been enjoyable.

Family Camp - May 22-25, 2009

Pastor Ed Fleming will be our main speaker for family camp next year. Ed serves as the Director of the Central Pennsylvania Christian Institute, Inc (CPCI) which has multiple branches of ministry. No stranger to Christian camping, Ed has served as a board member of Camp Kanesatake (near State College) a ministry of CPCI that offers youth camps and serves guest groups similar in style to Rhodes Grove. Ed writes, "I was born on June 9, 1949 in Fort Worth, Texas. My father was attending seminary at Bible Baptist College. Two years later our family moved to Orlando, FL. where my father planted a church. At the age of nine we moved to Maryland where my father planted his second and last church. The rest of my "growing up years" took place in Maryland. Throughout my childhood there was a strong emphasis on the Word of God in my father's ministry. Even at a young age, though still unconverted, I had a desire to know the facts of the Bible. I made a profession of faith at the age of five but was not genuinely converted until seventeen years later. Though heavily involved in religious activity (preacher's kids often are) I had never truly repented of my sin, had never seen myself as lost and helpless. In a rain storm, in 1971, in an automobile parked in our driveway I cried out to the Lord and He saved me. My life has never been the same. In 1972 I married my bride, Donna Leigh True. We have been blessed with 4 children and 6 grandchildren. She has stood faithfully by my side and served the Lord with me for

all these years. In 1975 I went back to Washington Bible College to finish my degree. While at Bible College God stirred within me an even stronger desire to know and preach His Word. After graduating in 1977 I have pastored churches in Michigan,



Oklahoma, and Pennsylvania. In every pastorate my passion and desire has been to faithfully teach and preach the Bible, disciple new converts, and then get them involved in doing the same. I continuously marvel at how wonderful God has been to me to allow me the privilege to serve Him and to preach the "unsearchable riches of Christ". Campmeeting - August 16-20, 2009

Rhodes Grove is honored to have Ron Ramsey come as our Campmeeting speaker. Ron is Bishop of the Church of the United Brethren in Christ, USA. He was elected to that position in June of 2005. Before that, he had served 12 years as pastor of the Main Street UB church in Walbridge, Ohio. Prior to accepting the senior pastor role at Main Street, Ron worked 13 years with Scripture Press Publications, Inc., Wheaton, IL. He began as Field Rep covering the Great Lakes Area, and then moved into other roles--a Marketing Manager, Director of Marketing Operations, and National Sales Director. He finally spent four years as Executive Director of Scripture Press Ministries, the not-for-profit foundation that owned Scripture Press Publications. In his various capacities with Scripture Press, Ron traveled extensively ministering in the areas of Christian education, church growth, and leadership. This resulted in national and international relationships throughout the United States, Canada, and overseas, and opportunities to observe various methods of ministry and administration in churches and

Christian organizations in their cultural setting. He was also the executive editor of the *Christian Education Journal*, a publication for professionals in Christian education. Born into a minister's family, Ron graduated from Thurston High School, Thurston, Ohio, class of 1958. He then attended the College of William &



Mary on a basketball scholarship from 1958-60. Ron was converted to Christ during a revival service in the Maple Grove United Brethren Church near Baltimore, Ohio, in 1962. He was mentored into the ministry by his pastor, Rev. Herbert Householder, and ordained by Scioto Conference in 1967. Ron graduated from Huntington University with an AB in Bible in 1967, and in 1990 from Wheaton Graduate School, Wheaton, IL, with a MA in Interdisciplinary Studies. He and his wife, E.
