



What happened to winter? Mid March...shorts, t-shirt, and flip flops? As I am traveling around talking at several different churches, I see the beauty of creation all around me. It constantly reminds me that

there is a Creator of the Universe. In the quiet of the drives, it gives me a chance to reflect not only on the Maker of the universe, but also of His undying, neverending love for us. Honestly, I'm not thinking about His love for mankind...I'm processing His love for me. An imperfect, broken vessel with questions, doubts, fears, hopes and dreams. I'm processing His grace that he chooses to pursue us with each and every day. Will I take the time to listen? Will I slow down enough just to simply take it in?

I'm reminded of the passage in John 9. You remember the story. Jesus and his disciples are walking through town and the disciples notice a blind man. They asked Jesus, "Who sinned? His parents or him?" Jesus says, "No one. This happened so that the work of God may be displayed in his life". (vs. 3) Jesus makes some mud and puts it on a blind gentleman's eyes (vs 6) and then told the man to go and wash his face (vs. 7). This happened on the Sabbath and the Pharisees bring the man in to see what happened. They ask him a bunch of questions; they bring his parents in who essentially abandon him due to their fear of what the Pharisees would say. Then this guy who can see for the first time in his life says this powerful statement: "Whether he is a sinner or not, I don't know. All I know is that I was blind and now I see". (vs. 25) How many times have I been blinded by busyness, worry, fear, or life circumstances? I simply need to take in what God has done for me through his Son, Jesus Christ. I need to sit

on my "foundation" of what I know of God and what He has done for me.

That is the theme for this summer's youth camp. FOUNDATION. It is based on I Corinthians 3:11, which says, "For no one can lay any foundation other than that which is already laid, which is Jesus Christ". I want students to be able to come to camp and see what it looks like for Jesus to be the foundation for their lives. I want students to know that Jesus, deep in His core, wants to be the foundation for them to build their lives on. He wants to be the basis for their daily decisions at school, work, and life. He wants to be in their lives regardless of any decision that they may have made.

The CLP (Camp Leadership Program) has been going extremely well. The CLP is a discipleship training for students who want to work here this summer. The number of participants has grown over the last few months. Here are a few comments from the students who participated in our last meeting: "This has been one of the most powerful weekends of my life". A comment from another student says, "Thank you for this weekend. I didn't realize how bad I needed this. I'm going to use this weekend as a milestone in my Christian walk. I'm going to live differently because of the impact of this weekend".

Alumni Corner

It was about this time of year throughout my childhood and adolescence that I would really get excited for the summer and, most of all, for summer camp at Rhodes Grove! I can remember being a day camper—learning camp songs for the first time and creating a cross during craft time in the pavilion. I remember my first week of overnight camp and how I thought my counselor was the coolest girl in the whole world! I remember how she talked about Jesus and cared so wonderfully for us (and how she gently encouraged us all to go swimming each day because she knew none of us were taking showers!) I remember riding horses for the first time and coming home so incredibly excited for the next year! The following summer is one of my sweetest memories of all—sitting with my cabin in the old tabernacle and hearing, really understanding, the Gospel message for the first time. I walked through a door frame that the speaker had sitting on the side of the stage, symbolizing my decision to walk with Jesus as my Savior. My memories of camp go on and on and each memory builds on the other. As I look at my life I realize that, somewhere along the way, camp transformed from a mere summer activity into a dynamic part of my life story.

As I grew older, I wanted to be a part of the camp experience for other children. And, to be honest, I saw how much Rhodes Grove had impacted me and I wanted to be there more than just one week as a camper! As a support staff member and then as a counselor and programmer, I was stretched and challenged and chiseled by the words of the speakers, the testimony and encouragement of other staff, and the experience of working for the first time in ministry. I learned to pray hard

and trust the Lord and I grew in confidence and maturity. I saw that God had gifted me in unique ways and that He could use me for His glory. I have memories of my own campers overcoming homesickness, learning to do new things, and singing with so much heart at the campfires. I remember praying with campers who, with tears in their eyes, accepted Christ as their Savior and I remember all the FUN we had playing games, eating meals, and throwing pillows before lights out. And as a staff member, besides the countless HILARIOUS moments we shared, I created deep and lasting friendships with my partners in ministry. (And I guess this is a good place to mention that God introduced me to my husband at Rhodes Grove! Dan even brought me back there to propose!)

All in all, I worked 8 summers before saying goodbye to my time on summer staff. I will sometimes hear people refer to camp as a "fun job" rather than a "real job," but I could not disagree more. Working at Rhodes Grove was as "real" as any job gets. It required supernatural energy and patience as well as leadership and humility. I felt honored to be entrusted with people's children for one week at a time and challenged to live out the Gospel for them in words and actions. I learned to work for the Lord and not for money. These are all things which I have carried with me into adulthood—into my personal walk with the Lord and into my ministry as a Marriage and Family Therapist (yes, it was camp that ignited a passion in me for counseling!). I now serve on the board of Rhodes Grove Camp and I am working on the alumni committee to make sure that the stories of other campers and staffers are not lost...because these stories of ministry-these lives that

have been changed—*ARE* Rhodes Grove Camp.

I continue to pray for the camp and pray for the unique ways it can minister to children and adults alike. In this world of constant motion and technology. of confusing and clashing cultures and ideologies, camp is one place where everything slows down to a peaceful pace. It is where the stresses of home are replaced with friendships, zip lines, water slides, rope swings, horses, canoes, swimming pools, crafts, and music. It is where children are encouraged to be who God created them to be rather than fit our culture's mold, and it is where teenagers and young adults are challenged to step up in ministry rather than slip through another summer in a cool basement with video games and TVs. Rhodes Grove is where the Gospel is preached over a crackling fire and hands are lifted daily in worship. Rhodes Grove is where I came to know Christ, where I was later baptized, and where I first served in ministry. And I am just one person. God has used this camp to do amazing works in people's lives, and I know that He will continue that work for many, many more years. Right now, I am already praying for those little campers who are excitedly awaiting camp to start—who are just beginning their own journeys at Rhodes Grove!

Easter Egg Campaign

This spring we are embarking on a fund raising drive to underwrite the cost of camp. Rhodes Grove anticipates hosting 400 campers this summer. Conference Ministry

As I think about the upcoming summer camp program at Rhodes Grove and the foundation that will be laid for a multitude of young people, I am reminded of the scripture ...I Corinthians 3 ... where the theme for this year's program is taken. In my personal devotions recently, I read this excerpt from Max Lucado ...and I'd like to share it with you.

I'm writing to say thanks. I wish I could thank you personally, but I don't know where you are. I wish I could call you, but I don't know your name. If I knew your appearance, I'd look for you, but your face is fuzzy in my memory. But I'll never forget what you did.

There you were, leaning against your pickup in the West Texas oil field. An engineer of some sort. A supervisor on the job. Your khakis and clean shirt set you apart from us roustabouts. In the oil field pecking order, we were at the bottom. You were the boss. We were the workers. You read the blueprints. We dug the ditches. You inspected the pipe. We laid it. You ate with the bosses in the shed. We ate with each other in the shade.

Except that day. I remember wondering why you did it.

We weren't much to look at. What wasn't sweaty was oily. Faces burnt from the sun; skin black from the grease. Didn't bother me, though. I was there only for the summer. A highschool boy earning good money laying pipe.

We weren't much to listen to, either. Our language was sandpaper coarse. After lunch, we'd light the cigarettes and begin the jokes. Someone always had a deck of cards with lacy-clad girls on the back. For thirty minutes in the heat of the day, the oil patch became Las Vegas—replete with foul language, dirty stories, blackjack, and barstools that doubled as lunch pails.

In the middle of such a game, you approached us. I thought you had a job for us that couldn't wait another few minutes. Like the others, I groaned when I saw you coming.

You were nervous. You shifted your weight from one leg to the other as you began to speak."Uh, fellows," you started. We turned and looked up at you."I, uh, I just wanted, uh, to invite ... "You were way out of your comfort zone. I had no idea what you might be about to say, but I knew that it had nothing to do with work.

"I just wanted to tell you that, uh, our church is having a service tonight and, uh ... " "What?" I couldn't believe it. "He's talking church? Out here? With us?" "I wanted to invite any of you to come along."

Silence. Screaming silence.

Several guys stared at the dirt. A few shot glances at the others. Snickers rose just inches from the surface. "Well, that's it. Uh, if any of you want to go ... uh, let me know." After you turned and left, we turned and laughed. We called

you "reverend," "preacher," and "the pope." We poked fun at each other, daring one another to go. You became the butt of the day's jokes.

I'm sure you knew that. I'm sure you went back to your truck knowing

the only good you'd done was to make a good fool out of yourself. If that's what you thought, then you were wrong. That's the reason for this letter.

Some five years later, a college sophomore was struggling with a decision. He had drifted from the faith given to him by his parents. He wanted to come back. He wanted to come home. But the price was high. His friends might laugh. His habits would have to change. His reputation would have to be overcome.

Could he do it? Did he have the courage? That's when I thought of you. As I sat in my dorm room late one night, looking for the guts to do what I knew was right, I thought of you. I thought of how your love for God had been greater than your love for your reputation. I thought of how your obedience had been greater than your common sense. I remembered how you had cared more about making disciples than about making a good first impression. And when I thought of you, your memory became my motivation. So I came home.

I've told your story dozens of times to thousands of people. Each time the reaction is the same: The audience becomes a sea of smiles, and heads bob in understanding. Some smile because they think of the "clean-shirted engineers" in their lives. They remember the neighbor who brought the cake, the aunt who wrote the letter, the teacher who listened ... Others smile because they have done what you did. And they, too, wonder if their "lunchtime loyalty" was worth the effort.

You wondered that. What you did that day wasn't much. And I'm sure you walked away that day thinking that your efforts had been wasted. They weren't.

So I'm writing to say thanks. Thanks for the example. Thanks for the courage. Thanks for giving your lunch to God. He did something with it; it became the bread of life for me. ~ Max Lucado

So I ask ... what about you...will you step out of your comfort zone and help Rhodes Grove share the good news with our campers this summer? Will you consider being a Rhodes Grove liaison at your church? Is your love for God greater than your love for your reputation? Is your obedience greater than your common sense? Do you really care about making disciples? What kind of legacy do you desire to leave? Will you share your financial resources to help make Rhodes Grove summer camp possible? Can we count on you to provide the bread of life for our youth today?
